



Originally known by its Inuktitut name, "Maggovik," the community of Makkovik dates back to 1860 when Torsten Kverna Andersen, a Norwegian immigrant, established a small trading post with his wife Mary Ann Thomas.



## Climate

Makkovik has a subarctic climate characterized by cool summers and cold winters, largely due to its proximity to the Labrador Sea. Throughout the year, the temperature ranges from around -21°C to 17°C with winter bringing significant snowfall.

# Local Opportunities and Attractions

## National Parks

### Torngat National Park

A 9,700 km<sup>2</sup> wilderness area, located 200 kms north of the community of Nain. The Park is an area that includes mountains, polar bears, small glaciers, and caribou and is where the Inuit hunt, fish, and travel. The park also includes the Torngat Base camp and research Station.

### Mealy Mountain National Park

The largest National Park in eastern Canada, the Mealy Mountain Park is a 10,700 km<sup>2</sup> park area with a landscape of mountain tundra, marine coasts, boreal forests, islands and rivers that have been traditional hunting, trapping and fishing areas for Indigenous people of Labrador.

Makkovik has many skilled artisans who provide a variety of crafts that are exclusive to the region.

## Developing Cruise Ship Market

Nunatsiavut communities welcomed 1,741 cruise ship passengers during the 2022-2024 seasons.

In 2022, approximately 4% of NL residents travelling within the province visited Labrador. Residents tended to stay longer in Labrador (11 nights) than in other parts of the province (overall average of 3.4 nights). Labrador was the primary destination of approximately 7% non-residents visiting NL.

## Children and Youth Programming

Programs run from September-June

- Ages 0-4 – Monthly
- Grades K-3 (Kids Club) – Weekly
- Grades 4-6 (Kids Club) – Weekly
- Teens – Monthly

Other youth programs include minor hockey and Junior Canadian Rangers (ages 12-18). There is also a multi-purpose gymnasium and an arena in the community.

Regulated child care is available at the Suguset TigikKuk Centre for ages 2-5.

## Remoteness

Makkovik is a remote community. There is currently no road access to Nain so residents travel by air or marine transport to commute to neighboring communities or travel outside the region. Remoteness impacts many aspects of the community including food security, energy infrastructure, and telecommunications.

### Energy Infrastructure

Most households rely on wood and oil for heat.

Solar panels are now among the available energy options.

Makkovik relies on a NL Hydro Fossil-Diesel plant for electricity generation. Fuel is transported by ship.

- Demand: 3,893 MWh/year

### Food Security

According to a 2014 Household Survey, 35.1% of households in Makkovik were found to be food insecure—experiencing worry about or difficulty in accessing food on a regular basis.

61.1% of households in Nunatsiavut were found to be food insecure.








## Population Structure (2021)

86% of Makkovik's population identifies as Indigenous.



## Community School Enrollment (2024-2025)





## Work Activity (2021)


In 2021, 34% of Makkovik’s employed population were full-time, year-round. 66% of the employed population were part-time and/or part year (for example, seasonal employment).



Participating in the labour force means a person is employed or looking for work. The unemployment rate indicates the proportion of individuals participating in the labour force that are currently unemployed and looking for work (often collecting Employment Insurance).

### Median Income (2019)

In 2019, the median income in Makkovik was \$31,600. Approximately half of the population received less and half of the population received more than this amount.

### Employment Insurance (2019)

135 individuals (aged 15+) in Makkovik collected employment insurance benefits in 2019. Approximately 61% of recipients were men and 39% were women.
