
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Introduction

Nunatsiavut is an autonomous Inuit region in the province of Newfoundland and Labrador, Canada. Nunatsiavut was established in 2005, giving the Inuit people of Labrador self-government over their land and resources. The region covers a vast area of northern Labrador, consisting of the communities of Nain, Hopedale, Makkovik, Postville, and Rigolet. Nunatsiavut is rich in Inuit culture, traditions, and language, with a strong emphasis on preserving their way of life and connection to the land and sea. The Inuit of Nunatsiavut are actively involved in economic development, fisheries, conservation, education, language, culture and tourism, community programs, lands and natural resources.

Nain is the administrative capital of Nunatsiavut and is the largest and most northern Nunatsiavut community.

Hopedale

Apvitok – place of whales

Located in the heart of Nunatsiavut, Hopedale is the legislative capital of the Nunatsiavut Government.

Rigolet

kikiak – nail

Rigolet is the gateway community for the Mealy Mountain National Park, and the most southern community in Nunatsiavut.

Postville

KipukKak – frothy waters

Postville serves as a scenic, accessible hub in Nunatsiavut, providing access to coastal trails; a gateway for traveling through the bay.

Makkovik

Maggovik – place of two

The most easterly community in Nunatsiavut. Known for its active fishing industry and, specifically, its fish processing plant.

Nunatsiavut Parks

Torngat National Park

Tongait KakKasuangita SilakKijapvinga

A 9,700 km² wilderness area, located 200 kms north of the community of Nain. The Park is an area that includes mountains, polar bears, small glaciers, and caribou and is where the Inuit hunt, fish, and travel. The park also includes the Torngat Base camp and research Station.

Mealy Mountain National Park

Akami-Uapishk^u-KakKasuak

The largest National Park in eastern Canada, the Mealy Mountain Park is a 10,700 km² park area with a landscape of mountain tundra, marine coasts, boreal forests, islands and rivers that have been traditional hunting, trapping and fishing areas for Indigenous people of Labrador.

Nunatsiavut also has many skilled artisans who provide a variety of crafts that are exclusive to the region.

Developing Cruise Ship Market

Nunatsiavut communities welcomed 1,741 cruise ship passengers during the 2022-2024 seasons.

In 2022, approximately 4% of NL residents travelling within the province visited Labrador. Residents tended to stay longer in Labrador (11 nights) than in other parts of the province (overall average of 3.4 nights). Labrador was the primary destination of approximately 7% non-residents visiting NL.

Nature and Geography

Nunatsiavut's lands and sea are the foundations of our communities. Our ancestors have always found everything they need to survive on the land and in the sea around them, including food, medicine, shelter, clothing, and tools.

Labrador Inuit Lands are defined within the Labrador Inuit Land Claims Agreement. Within Nunatsiavut, Inuit own approximately 15,800 km² of land.

Within Labrador Inuit Lands, 3,950 km² are further defined as Specified Material Land, which means that Inuit have the exclusive right to ownership of quarry materials and a 25 percent ownership interest in subsurface resources in this area.

Plants and Animals

There is an abundance of wild animals and plants that live on the lands and in the seas of Nunatsiavut. These plants and animals have always sustained our communities. This intimate knowledge of wildlife provides a great opportunity to take visitors out to view the region.

Animals: caribou, polar bears, black bears, seals, porcupine, hares, lynx, salmon, arctic char, trout, capelin, snow crab, eagles, hawks, geese, ducks, grouse, ptarmigan

Plants: blueberry, partridgeberry, cloudberry, raspberry, wild orchids, moss, lichens

Geography

Nunatsiavut is home to some breathtaking wild spaces. Comprising 72,520 km² (roughly the same size as the entire province of New Brunswick), the majority of Nunatsiavut is pristine, wild space. Rivers are fed by glaciers and animals and plant life can be found in abundance. Mainland Canada's highest mountains east of the Rockies are found in the Torngat National Park, in the northern section of Nunatsiavut.

There are a variety of distinct ecological areas in Nunatsiavut

Arctic Alpine Tundra

Found in the northern areas of Nunatsiavut, this ecological zone is dominated by rock and open ground with patches of moss, lichens, and meadows. No tall shrubs or trees grow here. Very mountainous with dramatic fjords.

Coastal Barrens

Found along the Nunatsiavut coastline, this zone is characterized by long, sheltered coastal inlets featuring spruce forests in the valleys and shrub barrens on the higher ground.

Subarctic Tundra

Found in the majority of Nunatsiavut, especially in the Nain area, this zone is mountainous and dominated by rock and open ground, with black spruce forests in the valleys.

Boreal and Subarctic Forest

Found in the southern ranges of Nunatsiavut, this area supports productive forests of black spruce and balsam fir, with some hardwoods.

All the ecological zones of Nunatsiavut are very sensitive due to thin soils, limited vegetation, and a harsh climate.

Remoteness

Nunatsiavut has five remote communities. There is currently no road access so residents travel by air or marine transport to commute to neighboring communities or to travel outside the region. Remoteness impacts many aspects of the region including food security, energy infrastructure, and telecommunications.

Food Security

According to a 2014 Household Survey, 61.1% of households in Nunatsiavut were found to be food insecure—experiencing worry about or difficulty in accessing food on a regular basis.

Energy Infrastructure

Communities in the Nunatsiavut region rely on NL Hydro Fossil-Diesel plants to generate electricity. Plant capacity and user demand vary throughout the region and fuel is transported by ship. Most households rely on wood and oil for heat.

Additionally, solar panels are now among the available energy options and have been successfully implemented in multiple communities.

Scheduled air services are available year-round through Air Borealis (operating out of Happy Valley-Goose Bay). Each Nunatsiavut community has its own gravel airstrip.








Population Structure (2021)

94% of Nunatsiavut's population identifies as Indigenous.




The Nunatsiavut region has five K-12 Newfoundland and Labrador English School District (NLESD) schools. Total enrollment is 518 students.



Work Activity (2021)


In 2021, 53% of Nunatsiavut’s employed population were full-time, year-round. 47% of the employed population were part-time and/or part year (for example, seasonal employment).



Participating in the labour force means a person is employed or looking for work. The unemployment rate indicates the proportion of individuals participating in the labour force that are currently unemployed and looking for work (often collecting Employment Insurance).

Employment Insurance (2019)
